
Purpose

This Building health & performance intiiative specifically is focused on implementing an inspection and benchmarking law that targets rental units in Bedford. Bedford won funding from NYSERDA to use for this law. Bedford has created a draft law, committee and notified landlords of the impending passage of this law. The law will inspect buildings and identify heating and cooling costs of buildings to help tenants understand how rental units will affect their budget and adapt to increasing fossil fuel costs and also hopefully spur landlords to make buildings more energy efficient and help mitigate future climate change.
